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Introduction

One of the fastest growing sectors of higher education administration in the United States is the field of international education. Once the preserve of a seeming handful of experts, the field of international education has grown exponentially to include specialists in immigration advising; recruitment and admissions; credential evaluation; international undergraduate and graduate admissions; English language assessment; international athlete evaluation; education abroad advising; and many other aspects of this sometimes arcane field. AACRAO has been involved in providing resources for better understanding this complex arena for much of the second half of the association's first hundred years. In addition to numerous individual country educational system volumes, AACRAO published a guide for international education professionals in 1994, followed by a revised edition in 2001. This current volume, The 2010 International Guide, further updates those prior books with a rich array of topics by knowledgeable experts in international education.

We begin the book with an overview that provides a compelling look at the field as it now stands and end it with a tantalizing glimpse of the future of international education. In between these overviews are a series of chapters on an array of issues faced by international education professionals across the country. Some of these issues—such as international recruitment and enrollment management, fraudulent documents, and the continuing saga of the Bologna Process, which has been sweeping Europe for over a decade now—engender much discussion and, indeed, debate throughout U.S. higher education. The *Guide* also addresses vital concerns such as international credential evaluation, office policies and procedures, undergraduate and grad-

uate admissions questions, and English proficiency assessment, often in a how-to format that enables the reader to create or revise institutional policies regarding these important topics.

Most of the authors are established experts in the field whose names will be very familiar to international education practitioners. Some of the authors, on the other hand, will be new to AACRAO members. Yet the expertise of these contributors quickly becomes apparent as they address the specific international subject of their chapters. The wealth of knowledge and expertise represented in the following twenty-three chapters assures the reader of a truly comprehensive review of the entire field of international education. The appendices to the *Guide* represent a fitting epilogue by listing key resources, organizations, and publications, capped off with the AACRAO Bill of Rights and Responsibilities for International Students and Institutions.

No single volume, however wide-ranging, can provide all the answers to the questions that arise in international education. One reason that so many of us have remained in the field for as long as we have is that international education is complex and ever-changing. What was true last year or even last week may not be true today. The Guide is a good place to start in grappling with the myriad aspects of international education. It is hoped that it will serve to inspire a desire for more information, information that can be found through networking with other international educators and attending sessions at events such as the AACRAO Annual Meeting and the many state and regional associational conferences. Equally important publications on various international education subjects are also available through AACRAO. The Guide will introduce

you to this fascinating field and provide a solid foundation of knowledge, through which you can investigate further aspects of this dynamic subject.
